



# **NYC Real Estate Watches and Waits as Fall Begins**

Labor Day is behind us, but NYC's real estate market still feels a bit stuck in late-summer mode. Inventory remains tight, buyers are selective, and pricing is soft but steady across most segments. In addition, concerns around rent legislation, interest rates, and the upcoming mayoral election continue to weigh on decision-making for buyers, sellers, and investors alike.

#### Sales Remain Slow but Stable

In Manhattan, the sales market continues to move, though at a measured pace. Deal volume has declined from spring levels, with signed contracts and new listings both <u>trending lower</u>. Still, prices remain relatively steady, supported in part by the continued strength of <u>all-cash buyers</u>—now accounting for 60–70% of transactions in the borough's luxury segment.

#### Rental Prices in Manhattan Reach Another Record

According to recent data, <u>Manhattan's median rent</u> hit \$4,700 in July—the fifth record high in six months. Along with that, bidding wars have intensified, particularly at the lower end of the market where annual rent increases have outpaced those in the luxury tier. <u>Brooklyn rents</u> have also surged, with the median rent climbing nearly every month this year to reach the second-highest level on record. However, new lease signings in Brooklyn have slowed, and listing inventory declined year over year for the first time in 18 months—signs that tight supply is taking its toll.

### We Continue Watching the Fed—and City Hall

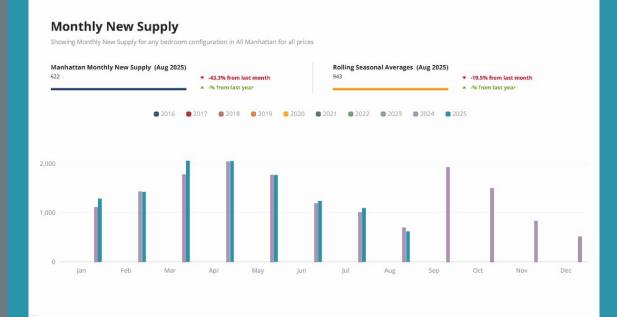
The Federal Reserve is widely expected to <u>cut interest rates</u> at its upcoming meeting on September 16-17. While some analysts were suggesting that a <u>mortgage rate cut</u> was already priced into the market, mortgage rates <u>dropped sharply</u>last Friday to an 11-month low. Meanwhile, with just two months until the mayoral election, Mamdani's <u>proposed housing policies</u> are drawing scrutiny —particularly those around rent control, taxation, and development incentives.

## The Bottom Line for Q3

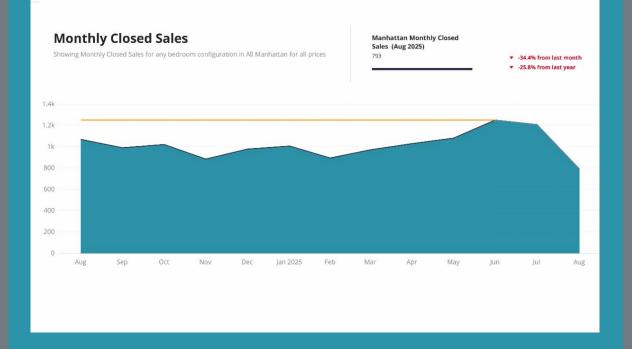
